

On July 8 2023, Kim Parsons received the following note from Bob Fasbender:

"Keep the newsletters coming, nice & colorful & informational - good job - go Radford."

On August 10 2023, Kim Parsons received an email from a Daniel Sims (not a Radford shipmate):

Daniel had been visiting a friend at a nursing home in Michigan and struck up a conversation with another resident named William Danneels. Turns out William served aboard the Radford!! Daniel did a quick search online, found my contact info and sent me an email. Just today, I mailed William several back issues of the newsletter.

On Monday, September 4, Mike Nave received the following email from RADM George Wagner 62-65 LTjg:

When I reported aboard RADFORD in the fall of 1962, Ltjg Dirksen was the very experienced Operations Officer and he mentored me, a fledgling Ensign, so very well.

RADFORD had been his first ship after graduating from the Naval Academy in 1960. In the summer of 1963 he moved up the ladder to an Executive Officer position aboard USS INFLICT (MSO-456) in Sasebo, Japan. Following that he took command of USS WARBLER (MSC-206), where he participated on Market Time operations off the coast of Vietnam. From there he moved to Europe, where he served as aide to the Deputy Commander in Chief, US Navy Europe.

In 1970 John left active duty for the Navy Reserves and returned home to Oregon. While in the Navy Reserve he held various positions, including Reserve Executive Officer and Reserve Commanding Officer of USS ROGERS (DD-876) homeported at Swan Island in Portland, Oregon. He retired from the Navy Reserve as a Captain in 1991. He was laid to rest on August 31st in Willamette National Cemetery with full Military Honors.

On November 2, 2023, Kim Parsons received the following note from Shane Williams, son of Richard Williams:

I'm not sure if you guys keep track of these statistics, but my father Richard James Williams who served on the Radford during the Korean war, passed away on August 24th at the age of 92. All of his children made it to see him just the day before he passed.

His oldest son, myself, and my youngest brother Darren went to the state capitol a few weeks after his passing for the Korean 70th anniversary of the armistice. We were hoping so much that he could make it long enough for the Korean consulate to come down to his residence in Washington City from San Francisco to do the presentation while he was still alive. But sadly he didn't make it . . . Richard Shane Williams



On February 5, 2024, Kim Parsons received this story written by Paul Alwine, who experienced his Midshipman cruise aboard Radford in1961:

How a USS RADFORD Cruise Changed My Life...

Way back when, I was fortunate to be able to attend the University of Southern California (USC) on a Naval ROTC scholarship. As a part of my Naval Science curricula, all Midshipmen students had to complete cruise training each summer. In the summer of 1961, I was excited when I received orders to the USS RADFORD (DD-446) in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii!

After an Air Force hop from Los Angeles to Hickam AFB, I made my way to the Naval Station to check-in aboard RADFORD. I had never been on a destroyer, as my prior NROTC summer cruises were on an aircraft carrier and a cruiser. As I was checking aboard, I was told that the berthing space was tight, and so I was going to share a stateroom with a junior officer. It turns out that the LTJG was the ship's Supply Officer (SUPPO), and I believe that it was LTJG Lloyd Tosse. As I settled in, we got to know a bit about each other. He asked me, "what are you studying at USC?" I replied, "Business." He then asked if I had ever considered becoming a Navy Supply Corps officer? I said, "I don't even know what that is!"

Over the next few weeks of my summer cruise the SUPPO did a "sales job" on me about what Supply Corps officers do as the "businessmen of the Navy!" He said that with a Supply background while serving, it would look really great on my resume' if I decided to pursue a corporate job after my active duty.

For the next 5 weeks I got to learn about all the various departments on RADFORD and stood watches in all the major areas. We had a number of at-sea periods, and I got to experience what it was like to be underway in a FLETCHER-class destroyer, including cruising is some post-typhoon weather that we encountered with really high waves and lots of up and down action! Sleeping was a challenge as I kept being raised up and down on my bunk!

All in all, I had a fantastic experience on RADFORD in the summer of '61. I enjoyed seeing Pearl Harbor and exploring some of the history of the base. I also enjoyed time off to go to Waikiki, as well as seeing a lot of Oahu with a few of the other midshipmen that were also doing their summer cruise.

Looking back, my summer midshipman cruise on RADFORD changed my life, as I became a Navy Supply Corps officer, which led to my lifetime career in computers and IT!
