Do You Know Why Sailor's Bell-bottom Pants Were Called Cracker Jacks?

Back in 1918, Cracker Jacks introduced a brand new, patriotic mascot. He, along with his dog Bingo, appeared on their box of Cracker Jacks, and his name was Sailor Jack. His flared pants gave rise to the start of the name given to the bell-bottomed pants worn by U.S Sailors.

However, the story behind the Navy's bell-bottomed pants goes way back before Sailor Jack appeared on the Cracker Jack box. Although no one has been officially accredited with inventing the bell-bottom trouser, the flared outlook was introduced for US Navy sailors to wear in 1817. The new design was made to allow the young men who washed down the ship's deck to roll



their pant legs up to protect the material. This design also improved the time it took to take the pants off when the sailors needed to abandon ship in a moment's notice. Also rumored, the trousers doubled as a life preserver by knotting the pant legs and used as a flotation device due to the thick weave of the fabric.



In 1901, the Navy authorized the wearing of denim dungarees as an alternative to heavier wool pants. With a few rare exceptions, bell-bottoms remained the official working uniform of enlisted sailors from 1913 through the 1990s. In the 1950s and 1960s, the concept of bell-bottomed pants became the fashion of the day. Some changes were made to the uniform over the years, and in the late 20th century, pants with wide, straight legs replaced the flared bottoms, but they were still referred to as "bell-bottoms", and the classic image of the bell-bottom-wearing sailor lives on today.



The Fletcher Class Destroyer

Our ship, USS Radford (DD 446), was a *Fletcher* Class destroyer built by the United States during World War II. Radford is just one of 175 *Fletcher*-class destroyers commissioned by The United States Navy between 1942 and 1944, more than any other destroyer class. The Fletchers have been credited with tipping the scales during WWII, giving the Allies the necessary firepower to offset the power of the Japanese fleet.

In a massive effort, the *Fletcher*s were built by eleven shipyards across the United States. Radford was built next to the USS Fletcher in Kearney, NJ, and was the fifth *Fletcher* Class ship to be commissioned. The *Fletcher*s had a design speed of 38 knots (70 km/h; 44 mph) and a principal armament of five 5-inch (130 mm) guns in single mounts with ten 21-inch (530 mm) torpedo tubes in two quintuple centerline mounts.







The long-range *Fletcher*-class ships performed every task asked of a destroyer, from anti-submarine warfare and anti-aircraft warfare to surface action. They could cover the vast distances required by fleet actions and endure the unrelenting pounding of the Pacific Ocean. They served almost exclusively in the Pacific Theater of Operations during World War II, during which they accounted for 29 Imperial Japanese Navy submarines sunk and numerous other Japanese surface ships damaged or sunk. Nineteen of the Fletchers were lost and six were damaged so badly that they were not

repaired. 44 of the ships were awarded 10 battle stars or more while 19 were awarded Naval Unit Commendations and 16 Presidential Unit Citations. Following the war all were decommissioned and placed in reserve. Some *Fletchers*, including Radford, were recommissioned and went on to serve during the Korean War and into the Vietnam War.
